Diwali

Diwali — is a festival of lights and one of the major festivals celebrated by Hindus, Jains, Sikhs and some Buddhists. The festival usually lasts five days and is celebrated during the Hindu lunisolar month, Kartika. This year, Diwali is on October 24, 2022.

Diwali, meaning 'row of lights' in Sanskrit, symbolizes the spiritual "victory of light over darkness, good over evil, and knowledge over ignorance". Diwali is widely associated with Lakshmi, goddess of prosperity and Ganesha, god of wisdom and the remover of obstacles, along with many other regional traditions. It is also a celebration of the day Rama returned to his kingdom in Ayodhya with his wife Sita and his brother Lakshmana after defeating the demon Ravana and serving 14 years of exile.

In the lead-up to Diwali, celebrants may prepare by cleaning, renovating, and decorating their homes and workplace with diyas (oil lamps) and rangolis (colorful art circle patterns). During Diwali, people wear their finest clothes, perform worship ceremonies for Lakshmi, light fireworks, and partake in family feasts where sweets and gifts are shared. Diwali is also a major cultural event celebrated by Hindus, Sikhs and Jains. We welcome you to celebrate Diwali in the Irene Lewis Atrium, Monday, October 24 from 11 am – 1 pm.

As I learned more about Western and Eastern religions I found beauty in how people connected with their faith and experienced peace in the commonalities that brought faiths together.
