Abuse	AD.1.12.1	Any act or omission by a person, or any situation created or caused as a result of a person's act or omission, that results in a minor being at risk of physical or mental harm. It includes without limitation any form of physical harm, emotional deprivation, sexual misconduct, exploitation or neglect which can injure or psychologically harm a minor. For detailed definitions, see Schedule A, an Associated Document to this procedure.
Academic activities	AC.2.18	Teaching, program and course development, program and course delivery, learning, scholarly activity and applied research, academic administration and governance, and academic advising.
	AD.4.7.1	Activities and operations that support SAIT's regular business and mandate. These include but are not limited to teaching, program and course development, program and course delivery, learning, scholarly activity and applied research, academic administration and governance, and academic advising.
Academic Calendar	AC.2.1.1 AC.3.1.1	SAIT's official document that describes its approved academic, apprenticeship, and pre-employment programs. It includes information about admission, selection, tuition fees, important dates and deadlines, student services, international students, financial assistance and academic and institutional regulations. The online calendar is SAIT's official Academic Calendar.
Academic freedom	AC.2.18	Academic freedom includes: a) The freedom to teach and, where feasible and applicable, to conduct scholarly activity and applied research as appropriate to one's discipline and to publish the results of this activity and research within the limits of SAIT's policies and procedures;

Academic misconduct	AC.3.4.1	Any action or attempted action that may result in creating an unfair academic advantage for a SAIT student and/or other SAIT students and is described in more detail in the Code. It includes but is not limited to plagiarism, cheating, collusion, altering academic documents or transcripts, intentionally or deliberately gaining access to materials before they are intended to be available, or helping another student to gain an unfair academic advantage
Academic Probation (AP)	AC.3.1.1	The status assigned to a student who did not meet the progression requirements for a program, or who was academically withdrawn from a program and who has now returned to that same program or to another program at SAIT.
Academic Quality Council	AC.2.19.1	A council that reviews the internal self-study, the external reviewers' report and the program's action plan, and that reports to the vice president, academic. Detailed information governing the council and its roles and responsibilities is set out in the Program Quality Assurance Manual.
Academic Withdrawal (AW)	AC.3.1.1	The status assigned to a student whose previous academic standing had been Academic Probation (AP) and who has failed to achieve both the minimum Semester Program Grade Point Average (PGPA) and Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) after attempting a minimum of nine additional credits (excluding course withdrawals).
Academic units	ER.3.1.4	SAIT's programs, schools and academic departments.
Access	AD.3.3.1	The permission rights assigned to allow data custodians to view, copy, enter, download, update or query data.
Access instrument	AD.4.1.1	Any instrument used to gain access to a secured SAIT facility or room, such as an access card, S2 access card, I-disk, numeric, biometric and/or mobile device lock or key.

Accommodation	AC.3.16.1	The process of making alterations to the delivery of services, up to the point of undue hardship, so that those services are accessible to students with disabilities. Accommodations are intended to remove or reduce barriers for students with disabilities or functional limitations. Accommodation does not require SAIT to lower its academic standards, and a student with a disability has the responsibility to acquire and develop the essential skills and competencies expected of all students.
	AC.3.17.1	The process of making alterations to the delivery of services so that students are able to meet their military obligations. Accommodation does not require SAIT to lower its academic standards: a student asking for an accommodation to meet his/her military obligations has the responsibility to acquire and develop the essential skills and competencies expected of all students.
Accommodation plan	AC.3.16.1	The documented plan between SAIT and the student that specifies the reasonable accommodations that SAIT will provide for the student.
Accounting clerk	FN.7.1.4	Finance employee who reviews and audits approved cardholder submissions (monthly statement, receipts, and approvals).
Acrobatics	AD.4.5.1	Any action on a transportation device in which both blades, skates or wheels are off the ground simultaneously, or where the device is being used in a manner not consistent with normal transportation.
Administrative units	ER.3.1.4	All non-academic units.
Advanced standing	AC.3.18.5	The status given to a student who commences a program with credit granted for certain components of the program in recognition of previously completed studies or prior learning. Please note that other institutions may use different definitions of advanced standing.
Advisor	HR.4.10.1	A person who provides advice and assistance to a complainant, a respondent, and/or a witness.
Aggregated data	AD.3.3 AD.3.3.1	Information that is collected and compiled into a summary format, typically for the purposes of reporting or statistical analysis.
Agreement or contract	AD.12.1 AD.12.1.1	Any written arrangement between the Board of Governors and another party with the intention of creating legally

Alberta Gaming and Liquor Commission (AGLC) Pro Serve Liquor Staff Training Program	AD.2.2.1	An online training program for people serving or selling alcoholic beverages.
Amateur cultural event	HR.3.5.1	Activity involving the performing, visual, film or literary arts or activity associated with library development, cultural heritage, historical resources and national or international study programs such as those sponsored by UNESCO. One test that may be applied to determine if an event is of amateur status is the funding of the event.
Animal	AC.4.3.1	Any living non-human vertebrate (such as fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds and mammals) and any living invertebrate of the cephalopod class (such as octopi and squid), including free-living and reproducing larval forms.
	HS.1.5.1	Any bird, reptile, fish, amphibian, insect, arachnid or mammal, excluding wildlife. For the purposes of this procedure, this includes a pet.
Animal Care Committee	AC.4.3.1	The joint Olds College-SAIT Animal Care Committee, operating under Olds College's Certificate of Good Practice from the CCAC and in accordance with the terms, conditions, rules and procedures already established through Olds College governance practices.
Annual self-assessment	AC.2.19.1	An annual check-in on a program.
Apparently intoxicated	AD.2.2.1	A person who is, or who appears to be, intoxicated by drugs or alcohol.
Applicant	AC.3.15.1	A person who has applied for admission to a SAIT program.
Application period	AC.1.5.1	The time during which SAIT accepts applications for a specific intake. This period may differ from program to program.
Applied research agreements	AC.4.1.1 AC.4.1.2	Contracts made between SAIT and another party in support of applied research at SAIT, and may be the result of utilizing SAIT's facilities, funds or resources. These contracts include but are not limited to non-disclosure agreements,

Applied research fund	AC.4.1.2 AC.4.1.3	The funds available at SAIT for investment in SAIT's applied research and innovation projects and initiatives. These SAIT funds come from an applied research and innovation endowment funded by the Alberta Science and Research Authority and funds assigned during the annual budgeting process
Apprenticeship Liaison Officer	AC.3.8.2	An official with the Apprenticeship and Industry Training Division of the Government of Alberta ("AIT").
Approver	FN.11.1.1 FN.11.1.3	A member of the SAIT community who has the authority to approve a claimant's eligible expenses.
Articulation	AC.3.18.5	The evaluative process which connects programs and credentials by determining the transferability of credit between two partnering post-secondary institutions. This process involves developing and implementing articulation agreements that facilitate the creation of student learning pathways and the movement of students between institutions. In most cases, one credential is used towards the completion of a more advanced credential either in order to satisfy admission requirements or to award advanced standing.
Articulation agreement	AC.3.18.5	<p>An agreement between two post-secondary institutions-a sending institution and a receiving institution-that specifies how the sending institution's course(s) or program will be accepted for transfer credit at the receiving institution. It can take the form of course-to-course transfer or a block transfer. Two types of agreements are possible:</p> <p>Receiving agreement: An agreement whereby SAIT receives transfer students from a partner institution into a SAIT program.</p>

Authenticity	AD.3.2	The validity, relevancy and currency of the record.
Authorized adults	AD.1.12.1	Program staff, members of the Youth Initiative Office, the youth activities champion, the external organization sponsor, and supervising adults from an external organization.
Authorized approver	FN.7.1.4	The cardholder's dean or director, associate dean or director, vice president or associate vice president, or president and CEO.
Authorized driver	FM.1.1.5	A SAIT employee, contractor, volunteer or student who meets and adheres to the requirements of this procedure.

Behavioural Intervention Team (BIT)	AC.3.4.2 HS.1.2.1	This team guides and directs an institutional response to reports of student behaviours of concern and assesses whether a student's reported behaviour constitutes a risk or threat to the SAIT community or to the student. It consists of representatives from Safety and Community Services, Student Development and Counselling, Employee Services, and the Office of the Registrar, and may include other members of the SAIT community as required, including administrative support.
Behaviours of Concern Committee	AC.3.4.2	The Committee provide guidance, direction and oversight of BIT activities. It consists of at least one associate vice president or vice president, a senior manager from Employee Services, a senior manager from Safety and Community Services, and representatives from Learner and Academic Services and the Office of the Registrar. Committee members cannot also be BIT members.
Betterment	FN.14.1.1	A cost incurred to enhance the service potential of a tangible capital asset. In general, service potential may be enhanced when there is an increase in the previously assessed physical output or service capacity, associated operating costs are lowered, the useful life of the asset is extended or the quality of the output is improved.
Block transfer	AC.3.18.2 AC.3.18.5	Where a student who has successfully completed a credential or a group of courses at one post-secondary institution is awarded transfer credit for a group of courses that collectively satisfies part of the requirements for another credential. This group of courses must have an academic wholeness and integrity that can be related meaningfully to a program at another post-secondary institution. Based on overall equivalence to a defined set of course and/or program learning outcomes, block transfer

Blood and body fluid exposure	HS.3.1.1	An incident in which blood or body fluid comes into contact with an individual's skin, mucous membrane or through percutaneous injury.
Blood borne pathogen	HS.3.1.1	Pathogenic microbial agents found in the blood and other body fluids such as semen and vaginal fluid and which may be transmitted from one individual to another through direct contact by these fluids.
Break in service	HR.5.1.7	A period in excess of three months from an employee's last date of employment with SAIT.

Capital costs	AD.1.9.1 AD.1.11.1	The cost of a capital asset that includes the purchase price (including GST, net of rebate), and all costs directly attributable to the acquisition, construction, development or betterment of the asset, including installing the asset at the location and bringing the asset to the condition necessary for its intended use.
Capitalized investment income	ER.3.4.1	Net investment income that has been added to the total endowment balance.
Cardholder	FN.7.1.4	Employee whose name appears on the credit card and who has been authorized to incur expenses or purchase goods and services for business purposes.
Case management	AC.3.4.2	A collaborative, team-based approach of assessing and addressing a student's behaviours of concern.
Casual employee	HR.5.1.7	A period in excess of three months from an employee's last date of employment with SAIT.

Challenge examination	AC.3.18.1	A comprehensive examination that encompasses the major components or learning outcomes of a course
Charitable purpose trust	ER.3.4.1	A trust established for a specific charitable purpose. Three parties must be clearly defined in this agreement: the donor, the trustee (SAIT) and the beneficiary or object of the endowment (the specified charitable purpose).
Chief officer	HR.4.9.1	In the context of Alberta's <i>Public Interest Disclosure (Whistleblower Protection) Act</i> , SAIT's president and CEO or designate.
Civil servants	ER.1.1.3	Directors, managers, policy analysts and trade officers.
Claimant	FN.11.1.1 FN.11.1.3	A member of the SAIT community who incurs expenses and who seeks to be reimbursed for those expenses.
Class C license	AD.2.2.1	A class of license for the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages on premises that are not open to the public and that are restricted to members or other defined individuals. SAIT's liquor license is a Class C license.
Classification scheme	AD.3.2.1 AD.3.2.3	A system of organizing records based on function and subject. Designed to support ease of retrieval, storage, access and disposition through consistency in description and control. Classification and retention work together to provide a complete summary of the records, what they are, where they are being held and how long to be retained.
Client	HR.4.11.1	Any body (including corporate, government, association or volunteer organization) to which SAIT has offered or is prepared to offer or reasonably may offer a product or service.

Co-curricular coordinator	AC.6.3.1	A SAIT employee who creates, organizes, publicizes, and administers co-curricular activities.
Co-curricular record (CCR)	AC.6.3.1	An official SAIT document validating student achievement and involvement in approved co-curricular activities. It is separate from the student's transcript and academic record.
Co-investigator	AC.4.2.2	An investigator working in conjunction with the principal investigator on research.
Code	AC.3.4.1	The Student Code of Conduct.
Commercial activity	AD.2.12.1	A transaction, act or conduct that is of a commercial character, and the primary purpose of which is profit.
Commercial electronic message	AD.2.12.1	An electronic message sent with the intent of encouraging participation in a SAIT commercial activity.
Commercialization	AC.2.11	A technology transfer resulting in economic rights.
Commercial use	AC.2.12.1 AC.2.21.1	Materials that will be offered for sale or licence and that are intended to generate sales revenues or royalties.
Committee members	AC.2.4.1	Individuals from business and industry who are invited to serve on a Program Advisory Committee.
	AC.2.4.2	Individuals from business and industry who are invited to serve on an Industry Sector Advisory Committee
Common area	AD.4.1.1	An open study area, hall or lounge. It does not include instructional space or administrative space.
Communicable disease	HS.3.2.1	A disease that may be transmitted directly or indirectly from one individual to another.
Competency	AC.6.3.1	A set of defined behaviours that provides a structured guide enabling the validator to identify and evaluate the performance of these behaviours by students engaged in a co-curricular activity.
Competitive bid	FN.7.1.3	A method of procurement by which two or more parties are given the opportunity to submit separate bids to the client in connection with the supply of goods and services. A competitive bid process may take place through an open

Compliance coordinator	AD.1.7.1	The employee responsible for coordinating the legislative compliance functions on SAIT's behalf.
Component grade	AC.3.1.1	A grade given for an individual assessment within a course.
Confidentiality	AC.4.4.3	The obligation of an individual or organization to safeguard entrusted information.
Conflict of interest	AC.2.4.1	A situation where a full committee member has a private or personal interest sufficient to appear to influence the objective exercise of that member's responsibilities as a committee member, or a situation in which a full committee member, directly or indirectly, competes with or aids another to compete with SAIT, or engages in a business or practice contrary to SAIT's interests, goals, objectives or business.
	AC.2.11	A situation in which an employee has a private or personal interest sufficient to appear to influence the objective exercise of the employee's responsibilities, or a situation in which an employee, directly or indirectly, competes with or aids another to compete with SAIT, or engages in a business or practice contrary to SAIT's interests, goals, objectives or business.

Conflict of Interest Review Committee	HR.4.11.1	The SAIT committee that reviews and acts upon disclosures and allegations of conflicts of interest.
Consent	AD.2.13.1	The voluntary and explicit agreement to engage in the sexual activity in question. It is the act of willingly agreeing to engage in specific sexual behaviour, and requires that a person is able to freely choose between two options: yes and no. This means that there must be an understandable exchange of affirmative words which indicates a willingness to participate in mutually agreed-upon sexual activity. For further information, please refer to <i>Canada's Criminal Code</i> .
	AC.4.4.2	Free, informed and ongoing consent, and for the purposes of this procedure, "free" and "voluntary" are used interchangeably.
Continuous selection	AC.1.5.1	A program where selection is offered on a continuing basis once that program has formally begun selection.
Contract value	FN.12.1.1	The total value of the contract over the term, including all taxes, service charges and other associated fees, but excluding the potential value of extensions to the contract.
Contracted supplier	FN.7.1.3	A supplier that has an established contract with SAIT and from which SAIT has committed to make purchases.
Contractor	AD.4.1.1 AD.4.2.1	<p>An individual or company contracted by SAIT to perform services or work for SAIT. For the purposes of this procedure, there are two types of contractors:</p> <p>Independent Contractor: An individual contracted by SAIT under the individual's own company name and paid through Finance.</p> <p>Service Contractor: A member of a company that SAIT has contracted, and who is generally paid by that company.</p>

It arises by statute in Canada under the <i>Copyright Act</i> and protects original expression only (for example, not ideas). It prevents reproduction only. In most cases, copyright subsists for the life of the creator plus 50 years. The <i>Copyright Act</i> also protects the "moral rights" of the creator. These moral rights allow the creator to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Assert paternity in the work or require the creator's name to be associated with the work. 2. 	AC.2.12.1 AC.2.21.1	<p>The exclusive right of the copyright owner to reproduce, scan, distribute, perform, publish, adapt, translate and otherwise control the copyright-protected work. Copyright is recognized internationally, but different countries protect it to different levels.</p>
Copyrighted works	AC.2.12.1	<p>Original literary, dramatic, scientific, musical or artistic works, or sound recordings. These include, without limitation, published and unpublished works, including books, textbooks, articles, software content and computer programs, CDs, DVDs, source codes, data, forms, compilations, pamphlets, lectures, brochures, advertising, manuals, charts, maps, circuit boards, feature films, documentaries, video clips, film trailers, sound recordings, drawings, cartoons, manuscripts, blueprints, architectural plans, photographs, music, and art works.
